Grace period rules in various jurisdictions— a 'round-the-world tour in 2,5 hours

Grace period rules can be used to give patent applicants a welcome respite in certain circumstances. A grace period is an exception to the absolute novelty requirement, whereby an applicant's prior disclosure is removed from prior art if it occurs in the grace period time window. Grace periods are implemented in a number of countries, but the way the grace period is implemented varies across the world.

Whereas the EPC protects an applicant against prior disclosure of the invention due to abuse or display at an international exhibition, many countries have a much broader definition of graced disclosures. Also, the duration of the grace period differs (six months or twelve months). What is the relevant reference date in each jurisdiction? Is it the priority date or the filing date?

Moreover, since the implementation of a grace period relates to the novelty of an invention, the relations Grace Period - Conflicting Applications and Grace Period – Prior User Rights are also of importance.

How do various jurisdictions balance these competing interests?
